described GWL's conduct as 'suspicious' and his 'political integrity doubtful'.30

On the 30 October 1861, Dr Mackay won the seat of North Gippsland over Mr Wood, 'the squatters' advocate'31, but 'turned' once he was in Parliament much to the disgust of the people who voted for him.32

In December 1861, the 'Gippsland agitator', GWL, appeared in Warrnambool assisting the liberal causes.<sup>33</sup> His name doesn't appear again in the newspapers until the report of his death. He died on 20 June 1864<sup>34</sup> on his own land in Upper Maffra (now Newry), land which he acquired the year before, in 1863. He died from injuries

sustained following a kick by a horse he had been treating for 'an attack of the gripes'.35 He was 33 years old.

In conclusion, I believe George Williams Lee was 'a good bloke'. He presents as a committed, passionate Australian who believed in selfimprovement, social justice, happiness, a work/life balance and jobs for all. He may have given flowery speeches that were a little 'too philosophical'36, but there's evidence to suggest that he wanted to dispel the social inequalities he would have seen in London before he emigrated. His ideal was for everyone to have equal opportunities in sharing in the delights of Australia Felix.■

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
